

PUBLISHING YOUR THESIS OR DISSERTATION

IN LANGUAGE TESTING


Language Testing follows COPE guidelines on the submission and publication of manuscripts based on theses or dissertations (<https://publicationethics.org/>). Excerpts or material from your dissertation that have not been through peer review will generally be eligible for publication. In other words, dissertations and theses that have **only** been posted in institutional archives (and not published elsewhere) are generally acceptable for submission to *Language Testing*. Such manuscripts should be submitted as the file type “Original article,” and should conform to the *Language Testing* Submission Guidelines (see link below). Original articles have a maximum of 9,000 words (all inclusive, except for the 200-word abstract) at first submission.

DIRECTIONS: To submit a manuscript based on your thesis or dissertation to *Language Testing*, the editors recommend the following steps.

1. Read the *Language Testing* Submission Guidelines, and be sure your manuscript aligns with the submission guidelines. <https://us.sagepub.com/en-us/nam/journal/language-testing#submission-guidelines> We recommend you create a new, eye-catching, succinct, and informative title for your edited-down manuscript to differentiate it from your thesis/dissertation and to attract reviewers and readers.
2. Have your ORCID ready before submission (<https://orcid.org/>).
3. Prepare a *Cover Letter* to the editors in which you explicitly state that your submission is based on your thesis or dissertation. Declare that your original thesis or dissertation was not peer reviewed and has only been published in an archive or repository for theses or dissertations. In the Cover Letter, provide the editors a reference (APA format) to your thesis or dissertation.
4. Log on to *Language Testing* ScholarOne Manuscripts™ Central to submit your manuscript and Cover Letter: <https://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/ljtj>
5. In the online submission system, confirm (with a check in a check-box) that the manuscript has been submitted solely to *Language Testing* and is not published, in press, nor submitted elsewhere. As directed, make sure you have fully disclosed your thesis or dissertation’s prior publication(s) to the editors in the Cover Letter.
